




Message from the President of Convocation

The University of Cape Town (UCT) has been ranked 173rd in the world by the Quacquarelli Symonds (QS) World University Rankings 2024. This is an impressive rise of 64 places compared to the previous year. UCT shares this position with Qatar University and The University of Newcastle, Australia.

Unlocking Futures Bursaries

UCT graduates are highly sought after wherever they go in the world, and rank best in Africa for employability. But what if you had not been able to graduate because of student debt, despite meeting all the requirements for passing your degree? Imagine coming so close to attaining your dream, but falling short at the very last minute.

Each year, UCT has a list of students who have completed the full academic

requirements but cannot receive their degree certificates because they have outstanding debt to UCT. These students are caught in a catch-22: without proof of their degrees, they will struggle to find employment and without employment, they will be unable to begin to pay back their UCT study debt. They have worked hard and deserve the bright future that a UCT qualification will give them. The amount they owe varies between R1,000 and R150,000.

HOW CAN ALUMNI HELP?

Empower the next generation by lifting the burden of student debt. Give the gift of graduation. With your help, we can ensure Graduation Day for all qualifying UCT students because Together, we are UCT. Make a once-off gift or, consider a monthly donation. UCT Student Wellness Services

The University of Cape Town's Student Wellness Service (SWS) provides health and counselling services to support the wellbeing of all UCT students. In recent years, mental health conditions across our student population have increased markedly, resulting in more students needing assistance, and for longer periods of time. The leading clinical presentation by students accessing SWS services in 2021 were anxiety and depression. Contributing factors include the impact of COVID on family income; bereavement as well the academic pressure associated with remote study during this period.

HOW CAN ALUMNI HELP?

Help us expand Student Wellness Services at UCT to ensure graduate success. Mental and emotional well-being are paramount to success. At UCT, we are working hard to expand the raft of Student Wellness Service programmes that address our student's current and emerging wellness needs. Expanding UCT's Student Wellness programme will provide our students with faster access to mental health services and directly increase their likelihood of academic success. Together, we are UCT. Your donation of R300 per month will give a student who needs it, two sessions with a peer counsellor. R5 400 will provide a student with eight sessions of crisis therapy. The UCT Food Sovereignty Programme

At UCT, we understand the multidimensional nature of inequality in our society. We work hard to remove the barriers many talented students face in their journey toward becoming successful graduates who will become economically productive members of society. As is common in low-income settings, students are cutting back on the amount of money they are putting to food and toiletries in a bid to try to cover non-negotiable costs such as tuition and residence fees. This is causing growing student hunger and food insecurity on campus.

Since 2018, UCT has provided different food security support options, expanding the programme over the years. The underlying principles of the Food Sovereignty Programme are to promote dignity and agency through our interventions, to ensure the sustainability of the programme as an ethical imperative as well as to demonstrate ethical conduct in how we deliver the programme, relate to students and our partners and, how we work with donations.

HOW CAN ALUMNI HELP?

Support the UCT Food Sovereignty Programme and help eliminate food insecurity on campus. We need cash donations to expand the programme, ensuring that no UCT student goes hungry. Your donation of R200 per month or, a once-off donation of R2 000 will enable a student to eat for a month. Your donation will ensure

The anti Gender-Based Violence programme

During the COVID-19 pandemic, there was a marked increase in Gender-Based Violence (GBV) reported in South Africa, including at the University of Cape Town. The damaging emotional and psychological effect of Gender-Based Violence can negatively affect students' lives in many ways, including their academic performance and the quality of their social interactions. It can also result in students needing to take a leave of absence from their studies or even dropping out of university. If unsupported, students can carry this trauma beyond their studies. At UCT, our Gender-Based Violence response and support takes various forms. It can be a survivor care pack, which affords a survivor dignity post-trauma; or it may be an Uber to Court; emergency evacuation and temporary placement in accommodation while permanent accommodation is located or human support during justice-seeking processes and psychological services. 66

Gender-based violence has many adverse consequences in our society: it can retard personal growth, destroy the dreams of survivors, and have a negative impact on the country's GDP. It can also have an adverse intergenerational impact," UCT alumna and founder of Alumni in Action, Zellah Fuphe

HOW CAN ALUMNI HELP?

Join hands with UCT in support of student survivors of GBV. Donations towards Gender Based Violence are dedicated to the wellbeing of the survivor and their healing journey. Our target is to extend counselling sessions to reach 180 student survivors of GBV. This equates to R1 million over the next 3 years. Together, we are UCT. A donation of R5,120 will provide 8 counselling sessions for 1 survivor. R25,600 will provide 40 sessions for 5 survivors. R200,000 will provide 333 counselling sessions for 42 survivors. <u>Watch the video.</u>







Project: 100UP

Our 100-UP programme recognises that the quality of education is not uniform across all high schools. It targets Grade 11 and 12 learners drawn from 40 high schools in Khayelitsha, Mitchells Plain and Philippi. 100UP provides an academic enrichment and Saturday School programme to give these learners the best possible chance of getting the results that will enable them to study further. We guide them through their National Benchmark Tests (NBTs), university applications and subject choices, also introducing them to campus life through a series of lectures, team building activities and walking tours.

HOW CAN ALUMNI HELP?

If you are an alumnus of the 100UP programme or were fortunate enough to attend a high school that set you up for acceptance for study at UCT, consider paying it forward to keep the programme going for the next cohort of learners. Make a donation of R200 a month to support a learner to attend 6 months of Saturday School classes.

UCT Disabilities Services

Many of us take our ease of access on campus for granted. But for students with disabilities, UCT can be a challenging environment – even more so when they cannot access the support they need to participate and excel alongside other students. The Disability Service sets out to dismantle the barriers that can prevent students with disabilities being included in all aspects of campus life. It provides specialised services to students with a range of different disabilities. These specialised services are provided to students at no cost – but the number of students who can be assisted is capped based on available funds.

HOW CAN ALUMNI HELP?

Make a donation that speaks directly to your commitment to an inclusive and diverse student population. This will enable the Disability Service to reach even more than the 400 students it currently supports. Your donation of R100 a month will buy specialist assistance for a student with disabilities or pay for fuel for the Disability Services minibus that provides wheelchair-access transport.





AfriFund: an SRC-led campaign

Unlike South African students, international students do not receive financial aid from UCT. This can leave some international African students from disadvantaged backgrounds in tight financial situations without many support options. Many students from the rest of Africa have to juggle their studies with working part-time to cover tuition costs; the cost of accommodation in Cape Town and all the associated costs of living away from their home countries. The SRC AfriFund is a student-led fundraising campaign driven in partnership with UCT's Development and Alumni Department. Since inception, it has benefited from generous funding from UCT Chancellor Dr Precious Moloi-Motsepe.
